Mayor's Message

On October 3, 1789, President George Washington wrote the first Thanksgiving Day proclamation. In it he expresses gratitude “for the signal and manifold mercies, and the favorable interpositions of his providence, which we experienced in the course and conclusion of the late war.” One of the interpositions President Washington was likely referencing occurred during the Battle of Long Island. A battle that he lost, but one in which (1) a providential wind prevented the British Navy from cutting off the American army’s only line of retreat across the east river, (2) a late night breeze allowed transport vessels to use their sails to speed the silent retreat, and (3) a morning fog uncharacteristically lingered for several hours allowing Washington’s entire army to be evacuated before the vastly superior British forces knew what happened.

President Washington concludes his proclamation by asking “that we may unite in most humbly offering our prayers ... to promote the knowledge and practice of true religion and virtue....” I wonder if President Washington was thinking of the statement in James 1:27 which reads, “Pure religion and undefiled before God and the Father is this, To visit the fatherless and widows in their affliction....”

This Thanksgiving let us not only remember the many blessings we have received, but let us also put our gratitude into action by finding ways to bless the lives of others.

2019 Municipal Elections

The Highland City General Municipal Election will be conducted on Tuesday, November 5. Candidates are: Doug Cortney, Timothy A. Ball, Brittney P. Bills, Kim Rodela, and Kenneth S. Knapton III. Wayne Knoll Tanaka withdrew from the election after the ballots were printed. As such, any votes for Wayne will not be counted.

The election is being conducted all Vote by Mail. Ballots can be cast in one of the following ways:

- Mailed with a postmark by Monday, November 4
- Dropped off in an Official Ballot Drop Box such as the one located north of City Hall by Tuesday, November 5 no later than 8:00 PM.
- Brought in to a Service Center such as the one at City Hall on Election Day, Tuesday November 5 from 7:00 AM - 8:00 PM.

Street Parking in Snow

As a reminder, street parking is prohibited from December 1 to March 31 between 12:00AM and 8:00AM and any time snow is present to allow access for snow plows. Council Brief

October 1

City Council approved a contract to line the detention basin on the corner of Normandy Way and Highland Boulevard with cobblestone. The cobblestone will help slow the growth of weeds and other vegetation which are not only an eyesore, but can also cause drainage issues and flooding.

City Council approved a contract to replace the Cemetery fence along SR 92. The condition of that portion of the fence is very poor, due in large part to the salt from the adjacent highway getting on to the fence during the winter and eating away at the metal. The new fence will be powder coated aluminum which, based on staff's research, is the best economical and durable option.

City Council directed staff to proceed with the construction of chokers on 5500 West. These chokers are designed to prevent parking in the neighborhood next to the commercial area and to discourage traffic that is not local to the area.

City Council approved contracts for the footings and flatwork on the new Salt Storage Building. The building will be located at the corner of Park Drive and SR 92. Construction on the building has begun.

October 15

City Council continued the application for a Planned Development rezone for the Apple Creek Development to allow for a more thorough review by staff. The project will go back to Planning Commission on November 19 and then will be back with City Council on December 3. The development would be 5.8 acres and is located at 10786 North 5320 West.

City Council approved Voter Participation Areas. These areas divide the city into 4 sections and impact the signature gathering requirements of any initiative or referendums filed after January 1, 2020.

West Side Collector Roads Traffic Study Report

The City recently conducted a traffic study on the collector roads south of SR 92 (Timpanogos Highway) and west of Alpine Highway (5300 West). These roads include 10400 North, 9600 North, and Canal Boulevard. The purpose of the study was to analyze current and future traffic projections. City staff will report on the results of the study on Thursday, November 21 at 6:30PM in the Council chambers. All residents are invited to attend.

Short-Term Rentals in Highland

On September 3, City Council passed an ordinance governing short-term rentals in the City. The ordinance sets conditions to ensure the residential character of our neighborhoods is protected. Requirements include:

- Business license requirement and rentals are subject to taxes and fees, including the transient room tax.
- Unless the property is owner-occupied, the minimum duration of the rental is 2 days.
- Occupancy limits to ensure health and safety.
- Parking must be contained in the driveway, garage or carport, and not on the street or yard.
- Standards for garbage and noise.
- Rentals are subject to their HOA requirements.

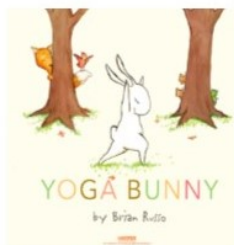

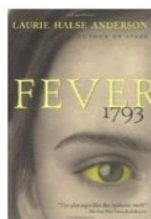
